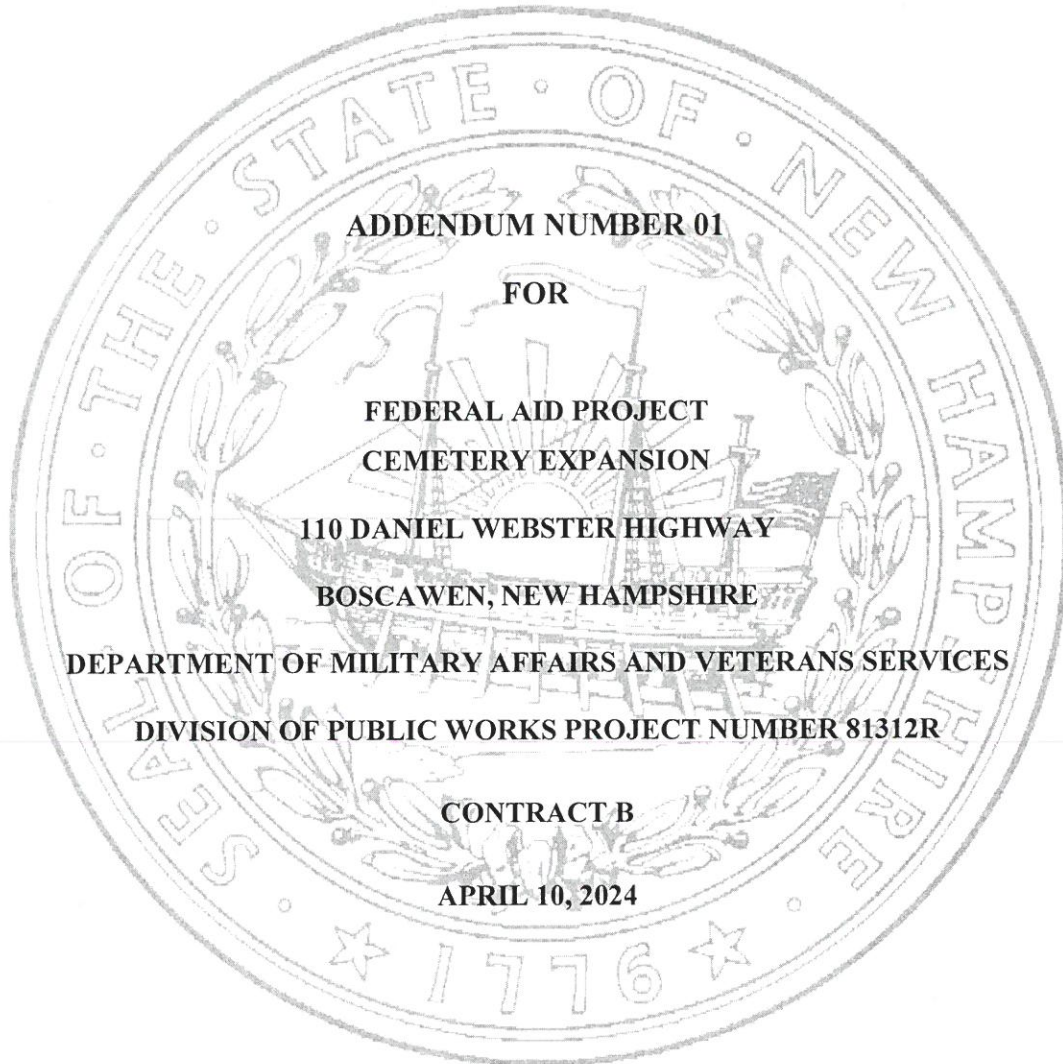

This Addendum forms a part of the Contract Documents and modifies the Bidding Documents dated March 21, 2024, with amendments and additions noted below.



**QUESTIONS/ANSWERS**

1. Question: The drawings and specification section 044010, part 2.2, section D.1, indicates that the type of granite veneer be “American Melody Granite – Clear”. The last group of columbarium’s that were completed a few years ago used a granite called “Mason’s Granite” with a thermal finish. In the same specification 04010 part 2.1, section B, it states that the cut stone shall match the existing cut stone at the current cemetery along with it having to be quarried in NH. Can the granite that was used a few years ago called “Mason’s Granite” with a thermal finish be used as we are not able to verify if the specified “American Melody Granite” is quarried in NH.

Answer: During design process, the New Hampshire quarried granite that best matched the existing granite is the “American Melody Granite”. An improvement on the previously used granite is the identification of the grade of granite to be used. The higher quality grade “clear” is specified in this project to minimize the level of veining, also known as movement within the stone. The existing granite used did not have the higher-grade granite and veins are visible in locations. This shrine should not have granite with visible veins and movement within the stones. The company Vermont Stone Art (VSA) are stone fabricators. They cut and shape quarried blocks of stones to the dimensions required for the project and fabricate stones from all over the United States and the world. It is our understanding the granite specified for New Hampshire State Veterans Cemetery is quarried in New Hampshire. The intent is this material is to be used for this project and it is not necessarily a factor of it being quarried in NH.
